West Berkshire Holidays, Activities and Food Programme 2023 Annual Report





The Offer

HAF is a Holiday, Activities and Food programme for children in full time education and entitled to free school meals.

We hold the experiences of HAF children at the funded clubs at the forefront of our HAF programme and are committed to enriching their experiences and opportunities during holiday periods and reducing holiday hunger.

The West Berkshire Holidays, Activities and Food programme worked with 21 providers, delivering at 29 sites across 2023.

All the approved clubs offer physical activity, nutritional learning opportunities, engaging activities and a meal each day they attend.

We have a range of activities from rock climbing to paddleboarding and kayaking to coding and crafting.

West Berkshire also commissioned several external companies to conduct visits to ensure delivery of those enriching and enjoyable experiences we strive to offer, as well as giving the opportunity to experience something that may have not been available or accessible to them otherwise. These include but are not limited to:

- Mobile Petting Zoos
- Reptile Encounters
- Library representative visits and free books
- Nutritional workshop and games
- Dance companies


Nutritional take home resources and activity packs, food parcels, budget recipe ideas were offered to all families that attended the provision. We also advised of other charities offering meals during school holiday periods.

Feedback has been positive and encouraging and shows just how valuable HAF provision is for the families it serves. It also reinforces why we run HAF and try to make it a beneficial (and fun!) as possible. We work with established and exceptional providers to ensure there is quality provision available.









Unique Children Reached and Participation

Over the 3 HAF delivery periods: Easter, Summer and Winter, we reached a total of 1743 individual children.

87% of these were Primary School aged children and 13% were Secondary schools aged young people.

Of these, 144 children were identified as having SEND and were able to access some of the HAF provision.

A breakdown for each delivery period is shown below:







Sessions and Attendance

Over the delivery year 2023/2024, 9730 sessions were fully funded, with each session offering a meal and exciting and enriching activities.



The DfE allows for up to 15% of funding to be used for children and young people who do not meet the eligibility criteria of benefit related free school meals entitlement. Throughout the delivery periods these places were allocated on a discretionary basis. A total of 99 children across 2023 were offered a discretionary HAF funded place.

Steering Group

In 2023, for HAF we had a steering group consisting of 4 members of the local authority. 
Finances

For the programme, West Berkshire Council had an allocation of £389,170 from the DFE. No additional funds or grants were used or acquired to support the roll out and delivery of HAF.

West Berkshire's spend for HAF 2023 was £341,422.22, meaning an underspend of £47,747.78.

A breakdown is shown below on how the funding was spent.

Promotions and Marketing

With such a broad Local Authority radius we wanted to ensure we raised the profile and awareness of HAF and reach as many eligible families as possible.

Promotional materials were produced and shared with schools and governors and the use of social media platforms was implemented.

Our promotional material was made to be eye catching and engaging and explained eligibility, the offer and how to book.

Our comms team also actively visited clubs to take photos and film promotional videos. One of which was very successful and shared on social media platforms and gained a lot of attention and saw an uptick in bookings and interest. We shared these videos numerous times with the community to celebrate the success of the HAF clubs.




Signposting

As part of their delivery, HAF providers are required to provide information, signposting or referrals to other services and support that would benefit the children and families who access their provision.

The HAF team supports with this by supplying providers with local services, charities and support for them to share with their families.

We signposted foodbanks and low cost/free activities that are local as well as charities that offer free meals to families in need. Below is an example of what the HAF team pushed out to providers.

Food and Nutrition

All providers must provide at least 1 meal a day (breakfast, lunch or an evening meal and all food provided at HAF clubs (including snacks) must meet <u>school food standards</u>. For most children, the opportunity to enjoy a meal at a HAF club is important.

All food provided as part of the HAF programme must:

- comply with regulations on food preparation
- take into account allergies and dietary requirements (see the <u>allergy guidance for</u> schools)
- take into account any religious or cultural requirements for food
- Should be ideally hot but we understand and accept that this is not always possible

A variety of meals were provided across the HAF programme, some meals were cooked and prepared on-site, whilst for the majority of clubs used a variety local providers to support the lunch delivery. Dietary requirements including allergies were catered for and we educated our providers on cultural requirements such as Ramadan.

Nutritional Education is also included in our HAF clubs.

The HAF Frameworks advises HAF Clubs and providers should ensure children are

- · receiving healthy and nutritious meals and
- developing a greater understanding of food, nutrition and other health related issues

West Berkshire commissioned healthy lifestyle workshops in a large number of clubs and each HAF child received a nutritional workbook (examples of some pages below).

The Eatwell guide, snack swap amongst other resources were used to deliver nutritional learning and education.











Challenges

Caterers

Typically, finding appropriate food provision and/or caterers was an inherent challenge. Many were either priced out, oversubscribed or didn't serve a particular area or meet school food standards.

To mitigate this, we raised our funding by 50p per child to allow more flexibility when considering pricing for food. We also canvassed existing and established providers to share their current caterers and explore options for collaboration which has worked well. Some providers undertook their food hygiene qualifications so they could then look to prepare food on site instead, which has also been successful in a number of sites.

All providers had food/caterers in place for every HAF delivery period.

Non-attendance

Whilst most clubs were full and attendance was good, much like a number of other local authorities some clubs had bookings from children that did not attend. This happened across a number of clubs throughout 2023.

We encouraged providers to make contact with any family that did not attend as close to the start of the session as possible and to also ask if the club can expect them for the rest of their bookings. This way if they will not be attending, especially for those clubs fully booked, we can release the place to another child on the waiting list.

In order to mitigate this further, providers were advised to let the HAF Coordinator know names of those that did not attend in order to implement a '3 strike' policy. Luckily, since it's inception we have not yet had to enforce this rule.

The HAF team has also tried to educate parents where possible about the importance of attending session that have been booked.

SEND Provision

Specific SEND provision has been difficult to secure. Numerous schools and providers were approached but none had capacity to engage with HAF at that time.

We asked our mainstream providers if this was something they could look to accommodate and a number trialled this but unfortunately, not all of those with complex needs could not have their needs met.

This is something the HAF team is keen to secure and is working tirelessly to have this in place.





Looking forward

We feel very positive and excited for HAF in 2024/2025 and will strive to continue to drive up standards and ensure HAF is valuable and enjoyable for all.

There are a number of goals and aims for the next year of HAF. These include but are not limited to:

- Secure specialist SEND provision discussions are underway with a local provider to offer HAF provision to SEND children in the second half of 2024.
- Encourage better and consistent attendance at HAF clubs we will continue to
 pursue and implement the 3 strike policy and discuss at length with providers ways
 to promote better attendance, such as attending parents evenings at the school
 where the operate. We as a local authority will continue to promote the benefits of
 attendance to parents/carers/guardians and the highlight effects of non-attendance.
- Design and implement a parent/carer survey to understand the value that families' places on HAF and how it has supported both them and their children.
- We also aim to develop and facilitate a way young children/ those that attend can have their say and feedback on HAF.
- Increase the take up and the HAF offer for Secondary aged children, which typically has lower booking and attendance figures.
- Continue to develop the HAF programme and offer enriching and interesting visits and provision for all eligible children.

There are free holiday club places available for children and young people eligible for free actionol meets. This opportunity is provided as part of the government's expanded Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme being delivered across West Berkohlms, which also covers the Christman holidays.

The sim of the HAF programme is to support children to eat more healthly, be more active over the actual holidays and have a greater knowledge of health and nutrition as well as being more engaged with actual and other local services.

The scheme provides enjoyable activities and nutritious meals for primary and secondary school aged children who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals.

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
Getting involved - HAF 2023/24

Eligible children will be able to access sessions throughout the holidays, at no cost to you. The sessions will include a variety of fun and exciding physical activities, including sports, music, and and other section opportunities to learn and develop abits, alongedue a runtinious mail each day. Nutritional resources will also be made available to children attenting the sessions.

The holiday club places will be available for the equivalent of at least four hours a day, four days a week, air, weeks per year, one week in the Easter holidays, four weeks in the summer holidays and one week in the winter break. See the <u>B. HAP Information Poster [1M8]</u> for full details.
